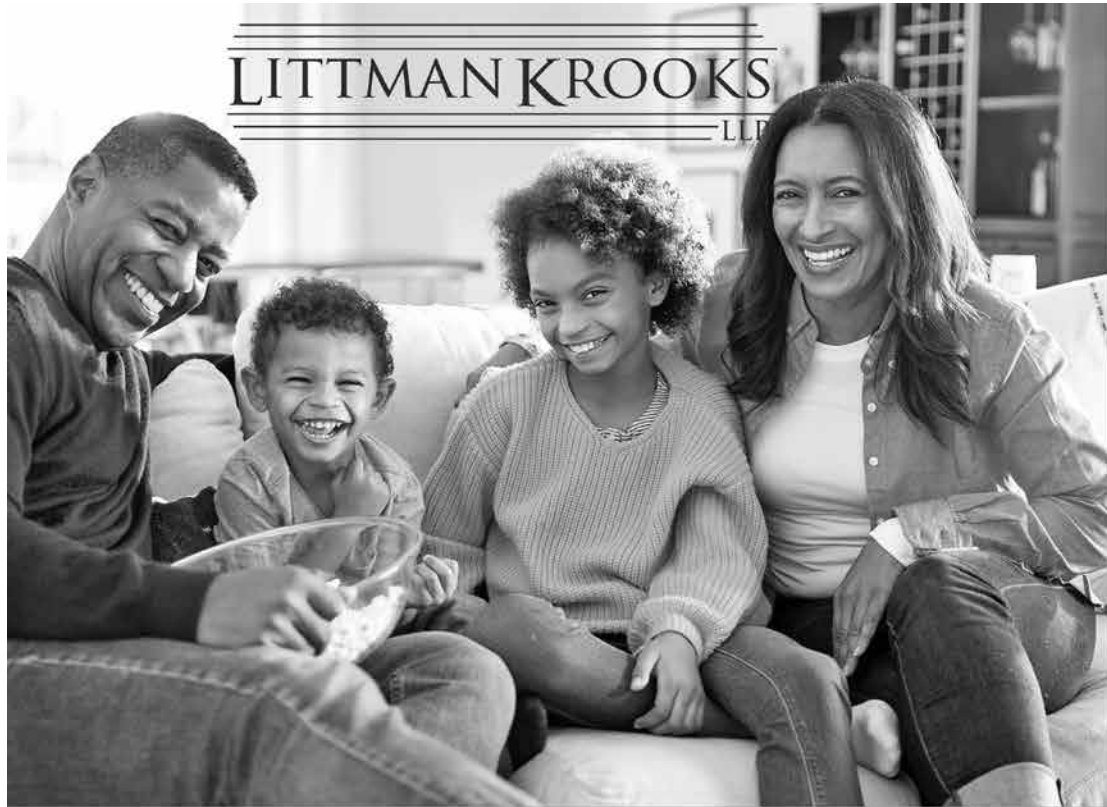

Village Enhances Park Benches with Cost-Effective Restoration



The Village of Scarsdale has taken a cost-effective approach to restoring worn park benches, saving taxpayers over \$16,000. Over time, natural wear and exposure to the elements led to lichen and moss accumulating on the wooden slats of many benches throughout the Village's parks. A quote from the manufacturer for replacement slats exceeded \$17,000, prompting the Village to explore a more economical solution. Under the direction of Superintendent Gray, staff purchased, cut, and stained new pine slats, completing the restoration for just over \$1,000. Davis Park was the first location to receive the newly restored benches. Residents can look forward to refreshed benches in other parks as the effort continues.

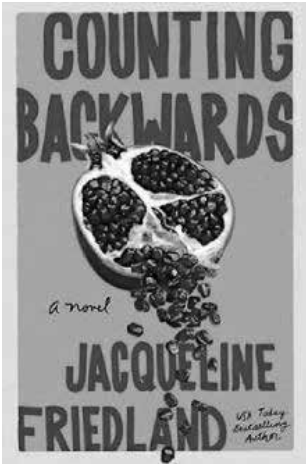

Local Author Releases New Novel

Jacqueline Friedland's books have been called ferociously insightful, wholly engrossing and unputdownable. She delivers her most thought-provoking book yet with **COUNTING BACKWARDS** (On Sale, March; Harper Muse; hardcover) a legal thriller that deftly tackles timely-yet-timeless issues such as reproductive rights, incarceration, and society's expectations of women and mothers. Based

on true stories from the 1920s and 2020, **COUNTING BACKWARDS** is a reminder that progress is rarely a straight line and always hard-won.

The year is 1927. A young, destitute woman in Virginia named Carrie Buck stands at the center of an extraordinary legal battle at the forefront of the American eugenics conversation. Uneducated and without any support, she spends her youth dreaming about a different future—one separate from her exploitative foster family—unknowing of the ripples her small, country life will have on an entire nation.



Flash forward to 2022. Jessa wants to have it all—the job title of her dreams, a loving marriage with her husband, Vance, and, above all else, a baby. But when her painstaking efforts to conceive fall flat, she struggles to find larger meaning in her life. The decision she makes next threatens to change everything.

Faced with the opportunity to take on a pro bono case at a nearby ICE

detention center, Jessa decides to pick up the thread of her family's long history of activism by representing detainee Isobel Pérez, hoping to help her secure citizenship and ultimately reunite her with her young daughter. However, what first appears to be a routine immigration case quickly reveals itself as something far more sinister. Horrified and outraged by this revelation, Jessa must make a decision: risk her career and relationship by leading the charge on an ambitious class action lawsuit or remain silent.

In this absolute tour de force of a novel inspired by true events, Friedland

expertly weaves between the past and the present, tying together the voices of Carrie, Jessa, and the countless brave women at the detention center seeking restitution. Friedland boldly encourages readers to consider the ways in which reproductive justice must extend beyond access to abortion

while highlighting the urgency of what is truly at stake; **COUNTING BACKWARDS** thus serves as a necessary, powerful, and timely reminder that progress is rarely linear, and the fight for justice is always one worth undertaking, no matter the risk.

A Note from Assemblymember Amy Paulin

On Tuesday, March 25, my fellow legislators and I submitted a letter to the NYS Public Service Commission (PSC) to fight for Westchester residents against Con Edison's proposed double-digit rate increase.

The PSC is reviewing Con Edison's proposed rate hikes, which, if approved, will increase residential customers' bills by an average of 11.4% for electricity and 13.3% for gas by 2026.

The PSC is now accepting public comments. Your input about these proposed electric and gas delivery price hikes is critical and will be considered by the PSC before making any final decisions.

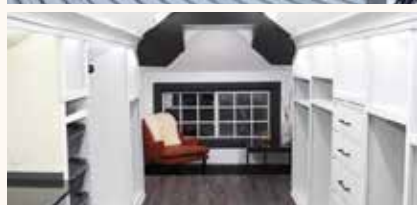

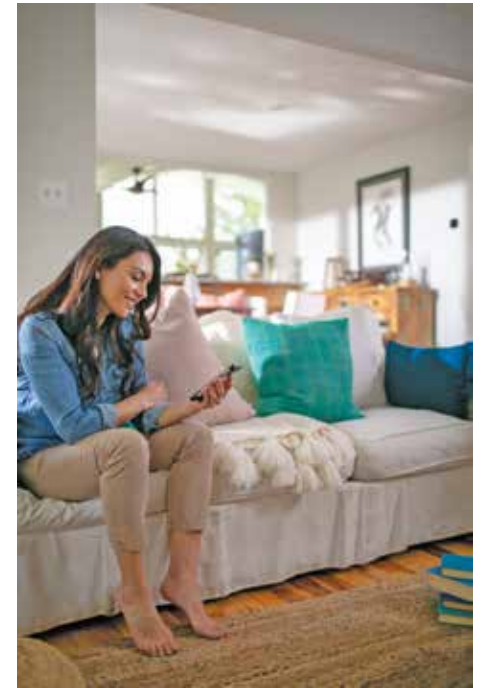

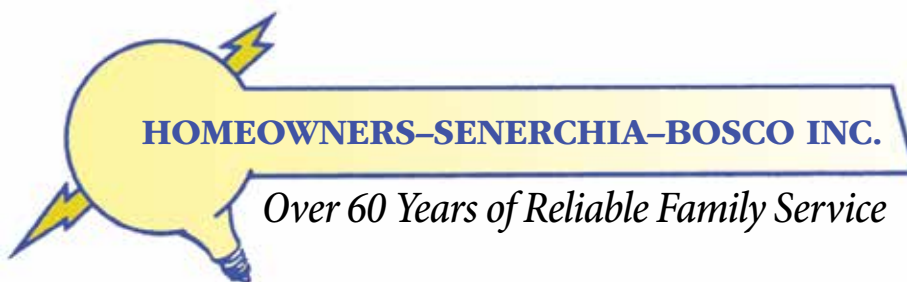
starting in 2025. At the same time, the EPA is implementing a phasedown on the supply of existing, higher GWP refrigerants.

The changes include a phasedown of high-GWP refrigerants commonly used in home air conditioning and refrigeration, introduction of alternative refrigerants with lower GWP that maintain efficiency and requiring manufacturers to comply with new standards for energy efficiency and environmental impact.

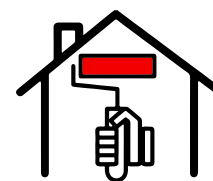

Teenagers Rowan and Christian Dias have already made a meaningful impact on the world. As passionate lacrosse players practicing in their backyard, the boys noticed that their younger sister, Elle, who is neurodivergent, loved watching them but found it difficult to join in. Rowan and Christian realized that when they adjusted the game to meet her needs, she was able to participate. Inspired by this, they created their own program to teach her in a way that made her feel included.

Seeing how well Elle responded, they had an idea – what if they could help other children with special needs as well? With that thought, Able Athletics, Inc. (originally called Able Lacrosse) was born. They began with just one young athlete. Rowan and Christian visited his home, brought him a small lacrosse stick, and worked through adaptive drills with

the support of a therapist. The brothers carefully planned the sessions, while the therapist helped tailor the drills to the child’s needs.

As their program grew, they partnered with a local lacrosse coach, bringing in entire teams as volunteers. This expansion allowed more children to participate and benefit from inclusive sports. Over time, Able Athletics, Inc. broadened beyond lacrosse, adding multiple sports, multi-week sessions, and even tournaments. Some of their athletes have competed in national lacrosse and field hockey tournaments, playing alongside both neurotypical children and other children with special needs. Rowan has also introduced Able Athletics, Inc. to his boarding school, bringing wheelchairs so that his classmates without disabilities could experience playing basketball from a different perspective.

Rowan and Christian note that Able Athletics, Inc. enriches not only the athletes but also the volunteers. Each volunteer completes an onboarding course that equips them with the skills to interact with the athletes and break down social barriers. At its heart, the organization is dedicated to fostering understanding and inclusion for people with special needs. The brothers especially love “seeing the smiles on everyone’s faces” – from the athletes and their parents to the volunteers who help make it all possible.

Looking ahead, Rowan and Christian dream of expanding the program’s reach, believing that “there are children with special needs everywhere” who could benefit from inclusive sports. They envision a world where athletes like his sister feel accepted and valued, both in sports and in everyday life. Together, the brothers strive to inspire others to recognize that inclusion matters—and with each throw and catch, they are getting closer to making that vision a reality.

We all want to do right by our children. Sometimes, even as adults, our children encounter cash flow issues and need a little help. So, as parents we are often called upon to lend money to our children. As lawyers, we hear similar stories all the time: parent advances money to a child and the child is not making payments on the loan. So, the legal question is how should you handle loans in an estate plan? Should the outstanding balance of the loan count against the child's inheritance on your death? Alternatively, do you wish to forgive the child's loan on your death?

Let us start off by saying that there is no right or wrong way to do this. You should do what is appropriate for you and your family. There is no requirement that you make your beneficiaries repay

loans, and there is no prohibition against doing so. You get to do what you want. However, it is important for you to be clear in your estate planning documents what your intentions are. Even if your children are getting along while you are alive, lack of clarity regarding repayment of loans may cause problems after your death; especially if the other children did not know about the loan or how much it was for. Perhaps you did not actually "loan" the money at all. Maybe you intended it to be a gift, with no strings attached. Or maybe you intended to reduce that child's share of your estate by the loan amount. What about interest on the loan? Perhaps you did not realize that the IRS may impute interest income to you on certain intra-family loans or may treat the forgiveness of certain loans as a gift.

Over the years, we have seen many different scenarios involving gifts or loans to family members. For example, one client advanced his daughter Jenna \$150,000 to help her make a down payment on her new home. After she bought the home, she started paying back the money, even though the client told her she did not have to. Another client paid his son Kyle's college tuition, which amounted to over \$200,000 over four years. Kyle is now a successful businessman and although the parent never expected to be repaid, he was

surprised that John never even offered. So, what do you do? If Jenna were your daughter, would you reduce her inheritance by the amount of money, which was not returned, that you gave her to buy a new home. If Kyle were your son, would you consider treating your payment of his college tuition as an advancement on his share of your estate? These are tough questions that require deep thought and communication with all interested family members in order to minimize potential problems down the road. Whatever you decide, you should consider adding language in your will or trust just to make things clear.

To make sure that your estate planning documents are clear with respect to your intentions regarding family loans, you should make sure your attorney knows about all loans or any advancements that could potentially be treated as loans. To avoid unnecessary litigation, it is important for your documents to be precise. One of your children might not be happy if they feel that they were not treated equally. If you think on of your children owes you money, please tell us about it so that we may address it as part of the estate planning process. If some of the loan has already be paid off, we need to know about that too. Since these situations often change over time, you should make a point of keeping us up to

date periodically so that your estate plan continues to reflect your most current wishes.

All too often, family loans end up under the category of "no good deed goes unpunished" and sometimes lead to family strife or worse, costly litigation among family members. Do yourself and your family a favor, please be clear about your intentions and communicate those intentions to all necessary parties.

Remember, you can also structure the money to your child as a gift instead of a loan. You can gift up to \$19,000 a year to your child without having to file a gift tax return. You can gift more than the \$19,000 a year, but you will need to file a gift tax return and your federal estate tax exemption will decrease. In some circumstances, this may be a better option than a loan.

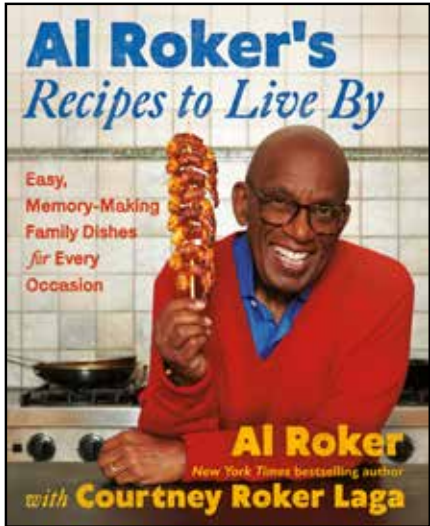
